As Dede Montgomery moves through grief to accept of the death of her father, the stories in *My Music Man* shed light on change, acceptance, and forgiveness amid close personal relationships and Oregon's natural landscapes. Montgomery describes small-town life in a school where everyone knows everybody, and how it felt to be an only girl in what often felt like a never-ending sea of boys.
