Without having the knowledge to understand written text, struggling readers are not constructing full meaning from print and are at a disadvantage because they are unable

to activate their prior knowledge and construct new knowledge. This applied thesis focuses on reading researchers such as Beer, Brown, Duke, Pearson, Durkin, Gunning, Wary, Medwell, Poulson, Fox, McKenna, Kear, Fielding, and others who conducted studies and found seven effective comprehension strategies to use with struggling readers. These strategies are summarizing, predicting, questioning, visualizing, previewing, monitoring, and determining the main idea. Each of the primary lesson plans included in chapter three incorporates the seven comprehension strategies using a particular children's book that integrates the four content areas.
