Arminianism as a theology of the people has lacked an acronym, one word where each letter represents the first letter of a doctrine, for years. Calvinism's TULIP and Molinism's ROSES have highlighted this gap in Arminian theology for years...until now. Arminian author Deidre Richardson returns to the theological world to pen a book that announces the world's first ever Arminian acronym and give the theology of the people a contemporary facelift. *God And Sinners Reconciled* is a work that seeks to present Arminian doctrines in such a way that the acronym and the doctrines for which each letter stands are biblical in nature. Like Calvinism and Molinism, Richardson's Reformed (Classical) Arminian theology tackles the doctrines of Depravity, Election, Atonement, Grace, and Perseverance while bringing a refreshing new take on an age-old discussion. The goal of the acronym and five doctrines is to give glory to God for what He's done in salvation, and this work does just that. In the person of Jesus Christ, God and sinners are reconciled. Deidre Richardson is an undergraduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where she double-majored in History and Music. Afterward, she attended Southeastern Seminary, where she received a Master of Divinity degree in Christian Apologetics. Richardson then entered the seminary's postgraduate Master of Theology (ThM) program, where she studied under Salvation and Sovereignty: A Molinist Approach author Dr. Ken Keathley. Richardson is the author of five other books: 1) "Short-Sighted Faith: Once Saved, Always Saved (OSAS) and the Doctrine of Perseverance," 2) "Doctrinal Deception: Responding to Carlton Pearson's The Gospel of Inclusion," 3) "More Doctrinal Deception: Bishop Carlton Pearson's Inclusion Further Examined," 4) "Lydia's Heart: The Case for Prevenient Grace," and 5) "Theo-LOGICAL: Understanding Calvinism and Arminianism." *God and Sinners Reconciled* is Richardson's seventh book.

She pursued four years as a postgraduate student in the Seminary's Master of Theology (ThM) program in the area of Theology of Religions, where she studied under *Salvation and Sovereignty: A Molinist Approach* author Dr. Kenneth Keathley. Jeanne Halgren Kilde's survey of church architecture is unlike any other. Her main concern is not the buildings themselves, but rather the dynamic character of Christianity and how church buildings shape and influence the religion. Kilde argues that a primary function of church buildings is to represent and reify three different types of power: divine power, or ideas about God; personal empowerment as manifested in the individual's perceived relationship to the divine; and social power, meaning the relationships between groups such as clergy and laity. Each type intersects with notions of Christian creed, cult, and code, and is represented spatially and materially in church buildings. Kilde explores these categories chronologically, from the early church to the twentieth century. She considers the form, organization, and use of worship rooms; the location of churches; and the interaction between churches and the wider culture. Church buildings have been integral to Christianity, and Kilde's important study sheds new light on the way they impact all aspects of the religion. Neither mere witnesses to transformations of religious thought or nor simple backgrounds for religious practice, church buildings are, in Kilde's view, dynamic participants in religious change and goldmines of information on Christianity itself.

In March 1997, thirty-nine people in Rancho Santa Fe, California, ritually terminated their lives. To outsiders, it was a mass suicide. To insiders, it was a graduation.
